This Easter Season we will be working on living into one of our goals from vision work last year: Improving Mental Health – Work to raise awareness of mental health and related needs and collaborate with community partners to increase access to supportive and healing programs. On Sunday May 21st at 9AM Redeemer will be taking part in Walk the Walk, a walk that benefits the Counseling Center at the Community House. We hope that as a church taking a visible stand promoting mental health, we can help decrease stigma and support local services that make a difference.

Vicar's Column





"Join me for Iftar!" A Palestinian Muslim cobbler, Emad, exclaims to my friend Katharine and me while we are perusing his shop looking at the boots he makes by hand. Katharine and I were the two global mission volunteers living in Ramallah, in the West Bank from 2017-2018. We had been in the cobbler's shop for less than an hour, learning about his trade and how he got started, before a generous invitation to join his meal. Emad was eager to extend hospitality and Katharine and I had shared with him that we were fasting throughout Ramadan (no food, no water from sun-up to sun-down), as a spiritual practice and to grow in deeper understanding of Ramadan and our 96% Muslim Palestinian host community. Days were long and challenging, and evenings brought profound and unexpected hospitality from the community which deepened and strengthened our relationships. This offering of radical welcome and hospitality from people in the community was common, yet still unexpected each time we were invited to join in a Muslim tradition. "Sure, why not?"

Our evening with Emad was full of laughter, joy, and good food. He showed us his shoe workshop and we each helped him customize a pair of boots to take home. Nothing about the situation screamed "stranger danger" and there was a genuine tone to the way we shared and learned about the spiritual time of drawing closer to God during Ramadan.





"...for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me..."
-Matthew 25:35

Ramadan was a time to pray, connect, and care for others. If I'm being honest, it was also a time I felt a little holy envy of my Muslim neighbors. "Holy Envy" is "what you feel when you hear about, observe, or participate in a religious practice of another faith and you find it so meaningful and delight-ful that you wish that your faith had a [similar] practice."

As a Christian, I don't observe Ramadan. However, there are shared values in Islam and Christianity that this feeling of holy envy can flag, and it offers deeper reflection on our own faith. I found this extremely transformative in the way I embody hospitality to others, in the way Jesus models.





Through the radical hospitality of the Muslims in my host community, I was able to more deeply reflect on the way I'm called as a Christian to my own values of welcoming others. It also helped me challenge myself to do better and recognize where I might fall short of embodying Jesus' example. In all honesty I can't say I'd invite a total stranger to my Easter dinner, but I did recently sign up to become a welcoming presence for refugee youth. There is always room to grow in the way I extend a welcome to others, and ask for forgiveness in the ways I fall short. I continue contemplating this example from my neighbors' welcome throughout Ramadan in the Holy Land, and it is part of the reason I chose an interfaith emphasis for our Lenten journey together as Redeemer community.

In our journey towards Easter, we're welcomed to consider how the faith of our neighbors might deepen our community relationships as well as our call to embody our own Christian faith with and among others. I'm excited for the various learning opportunities at Redeemer during this season, and hope it's a time of enrichment and depth for all. There are many opportunities, and I hope you will join!



RIC SUNDAY and RIC HEART ART PROJECT

Reconciling In Christ (RIC) Sunday was January 29th. We were fortunate to be able to invite Ezra Brown, a trans-identifying seminary student at Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, to preach at both services. The Festival Choir, dressed in a variety of colors, prepared Allen Pote's We Will Be a Shelter for Each Other and were accompanied by Olivia Corcoran on flute. We also enjoyed a special coffee hour with cupcakes from Jennivee's Bakery, a trans-owned bakery in Chicago, with gluten free cupcakes made by Gaby (Graeme's wife) and extra bars and treats brought by Nathan, Sonja, Aubrey, and Eleanor Will.

RIC Sunday also kicked off a 3-week congregation-wide RIC Heart Art Project, reflecting each week on a different portion of Redeemers Welcome Statement. Inspired by an "enfleshed" project and an idea sparked by Pastor Aneel, it has come to fruition in no small part through Vicar Kelsey's artistic abilities, Jacque Ravnic's paper hearts, and the guidance and help of Redeemer's RIC group. The music during the congregation's reflection and writing time has been tailored to each prompt, namely excerpts from Ned Rorem's A Quaker Reader for focus on LGBTQIA+ inclusion, Florence Price's Adoration for focus on racial diversity and equity, and two settings of the hymn tune Break Bread Together for focus on Redeemer's open table. The heart is hanging in the narthex next to the Luther Rose; the responses have been wonderful to read.

LENTEN SEASON

Now as the Lenten season approaches, there are many upcoming musical events. On Sunday, February 19th, we will enjoy an "Alleluia Hymn Sing" where we get all of our "Alleluias" in before Lent begins. Please join us!

This year Ash Wednesday falls on February 22nd. There will be a service in the Sanctuary at 12:00pm and at 7:00pm (the 7pm service will be in person and online). 
A few things about the liturgy will change in Lent. First, we will be moving to the ever-familiar Setting 4, but we'll stay in this setting through the Easter season! This way, we will experience the near entirety of that setting by singing the Lenten option for the Gospel Acclamation and the Kyrie (Lord, have mercy on us) during Lent, but move to "This is The Feast" and the Alleluias for the Gospel during Easter. We also plan to stop singing the Psalm for Lent, but will sing during the Prayers of the People.

During Lent we will also be bringing back Lenten Soup Suppers and midweek worship. Beginning on Wednesday, March 1st, we'll have Soup Suppers downstairs in the Fellowship Hall beginning at 5:30pm. I am personally excited to see these Soup Suppers in action, as I have yet to experience this Redeemer tradition! We'll then sing Marty Haugen's Holden Evening Prayer in the Parish Room (a Redeemer favorite!) from 7:00pm-7:30pm. Vicar Kelsey has also done a wonderful job in finding comparative and parallel readings from the Bible and other religious texts outside Lutheran Christianity. Please join us!



FOURTH GRADE COMMUNION CLASS

At Redeemer we offer a number of opportunities to learn about the sacraments. When children are in the 4th grade, whether or not they have already started communing, we offer a multi-part class where they learn with their families. This winter, five children, Veronica Gartner, Julia Procter, Caitlyn Reiley, Veronica and Victoria Zalik, took part in the class.

In our first session we read the story of the Last Supper and learned that communion is "for you." Using Luther's explanation of "our daily bread" in the Small Catechism we made collages of everything we receive from God as our daily sustenance.

In our second session we heard the story of the Passover and discussed why sharing a meal helps us remember God's saving acts. We played elbow tag, remembering the importance of our connection to Christ's love and played Passover Pictionary. As might have been expected, the kids were victorious over their parents.

In our third session we made communion bread and talked about the mystery of real presence (how Christ is truly present in the bread and the wine of communion). We acted out the story of the Feeding of the 5,000 and discussed how communion feeds us in many ways.

In our final session we focused on how communion empowers us to serve. We read about the early Christian community in Acts 2 and created our own ideal communities on paper. When tragedy struck (Snowstorm! Snakes!) we imagined how our communities might work together to overcome disaster. We ended our session taste testing non-blessed communion elements and talked about how to take communion in the context of the church service.

In four weeks we had a lot of fun together and learned a lot! Thanks to Redeemer for providing a place for children and families to learn and grow!



Redeemer Engaging Refugees (RER)

REDEEMER ENGAGING REFUGEES UPDATE

The newly formed RER committee started out strong in January with 3 weeks of refugee education and a giving opportunity.

On January 8th, Keith Draper from **World Relief Chicagoland** spoke to 25 attendees at Adult Ed. He spoke about the current crisis with refugees and how his organization helps to settle refugees and how our church could help.

Jason Mohn from **Exodus World Services** was the adult education speaker on January 15th. There were approximately 20 attendees. Jason also gave a Temple Talk at both services. Jason explained the many programs volunteers can be part of at Exodus.

On January 22nd, an ethnic coffee hour was held in the Parish Room. Two committee members went into the city and purchased delicious ethnic food from local bakeries. Delicious! A panel discussion from current RER members included a video and questions from the attendees. There were about 15 people and the conversation was very informative and productive.

In the afternoon, a simulation called **Fleeing for Your Life** was presented by Exodus World Services. Redeemer had 20 participants from different age groups. It was educational for all as we learned what it's like to be forced to leave your home with little notice and flee to another country.





Redeemer members donated all items needed to complete an **Exodus Welcome to America Pack**. We will be able to turn an empty apartment into a home when we get the call that there is a new family in our area.

On February 12, a meeting was held for the congregation to join RER members to discuss the next steps which include:

- Investigate being a partner with another church already serving refugees
- Volunteer and build relationships with both Exodus and World Relief Chicagoland and others
- Tutoring at Redeemer possibly in future
- Follow up with congregation for a Refugee Sunday in June

NEW NEIGHBOR FOR YOUTH PROGRAM OPPORTUNITY

The RER committee learned over the last month that the biggest need at Exodus World Service is the need to help children. In this program, adult volunteers visit weekly for three months with an elementary/middle school student. Volunteers help increase academic skills and confidence through fun activities, and partner with refugee parents on how to support their child's learning. Materials are provided.




Quilts will be on display Palm Sunday, April 2nd.

Financial Update

REDEEMER LUTHERAN 2022-23 SECOND QUARTER FINANCIAL REVIEW

Redeemer's second quarter of the 2022-23 fiscal year ended on December 31, 2022, and Redeemer achieved a Net Income of \$51,457. This is a great turnaround from the first quarter deficit of \$6,880. Offerings were up in each of the three months of the quarter, and in particular December. Expenses were also less than expected. Expenses for the year to date were 92% of the budgeted amount. We don't foresee any extraordinary expenses.

The church continues to stand in a strong financial position. The Balance Sheet shows total Equity figures at \$1,299,274. As a percentage of Total Assets, the second quarter-end year to date distribution was as follows: \$686,541, 52.8%, in Restricted Funds, \$371,942, 28.6%, in Special Designated Purpose Funds, and \$240,791, 18.5%, in Unrestricted/Undesignated Funds. We have 5.22 months of cash reserves at the current expense rate. This amount of Unrestricted Funds is about the average amount that we have held in the recent past. Recent market fluctuations have had the effect of reducing overall equity, and in particular, the Unrestricted/Undesignated funds.

2023 Endowment Grant Applications Available

REDEEMER COVENANT ENDOWMENT FUND GRANTS

Redeemer's Covenant Endowment Fund through the years, has steadily grown in value. As of December of 2022, the Fund had a value of approximately \$684,000.

Early in the year, the Council, acting in accordance with the Bylaws and on the recommendation of the Endowment Committee, determines what percentage of the Fund's value can prudently be made available for distribution to support Redeemer's various ministries and ministry areas.

Each year Redeemer's Endowment offers grants for support of mission outside of Redeemer, to support the building and other capital assets, and to support other ministries of Redeemer. Endowment monies do not replace budgeted expenses and cannot go to ongoing expenses (like salaries). Any member of Redeemer can apply for grant monies. The Council, with the assistance of the ministry committees, decides on any endowment disbursements.

Endowment grant applications are due March 15, 2023. Applications can be picked up in the church office. Total dollars available for grants are \$20,000.

Council encourages members to use this money as a catalyst for engagement. Examples might include setting up a matching fund for gifts given by Redeemer members to a ministry partner, starting a new ministry with potential to reach community members, and expanding an existing ministry to involve more church members than previously served.

Endowment grants allow the church an opportunity to take risks, grow ministries, and get more people involved. The Council encourages congregation members to be creative, to dream, and to propose something that, when accomplished, will excite others.

Grant application will be reviewed by Council at their April meeting. Awards will be announced no later than May 1st.

The funeral service was held at Redeemer on January 7, 2023.






PASTOR DENNIS BUSHKOFSKY

The Rev. Dennis L. Bushkofsky, 64, of Henryville, Pa., died at home Feb. 2 following a brief period of hospice care. A funeral service was held on Saturday, Feb. 11, at St. Paul Lutheran Church, Fish Hill Road, Tannersville, Pa.

In his ministry, Pastor Bushkofsky served parishes in Pennsylvania, Minnesota, and Illinois. A memorial service is also scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 25, at 2 p.m. at United Lutheran Church, Oak Park, Ill., his most recent call, where he served 10 years before going on disability in mid-2022. During his time there, he was active in the Community of Congregations, an interfaith organization serving Oak Park, River Forest and surrounding communities.


Throughout his career, Pastor Bushkofsky was an editor and writer of liturgical materials and an educator in the adult catechumenate movement.

Healthy Spiritual Journey

THE MYSTERIOUS CLOUD OF WITNESSES

To experience the mysterious, it seems that we have to be willing to let go of certainty and be willing to allow our imaginations and our instincts to guide us. Those of us who have faith in God enter a world of mystery every time we pray or enter into a worship experience. Physicians, practicing the art and science of medicine, know that there is only so much control we have in helping our patients return to fullness of life after a serious injury or illness. Science has helped us develop lifesaving medicines and amazing surgical procedures, but the mysterious power of healing is often beyond our control. Sometimes our patients die despite our best efforts; sometimes we witness complete healing when we thought that our best efforts would not be good enough. In some ways, religious faith is similar to the art and science of medicine - both beautiful to experience in the fullness of their mystery.

One of the meaningful mysteries of faith in my life is addressed in the book of Hebrews, in the second testament of the Christian Bible. There the writer addresses a "great cloud of witnesses" when he speaks about the champions of faith who came before the audience he addressed. My question for that theologian, and to you my audience, is: "Who are the great cloud of witnesses today?"




Are they our ancestors — especially the ones who introduced us to God? Are they the people we can still remember who have died and we feel have gone to heaven? Are they our guardian angel(s)? Are there guardian angels? How about the leaders who have helped humanity progress in positive ways? How about people such as the apostles, Mary Mother of God, the evangelist Paul, Mahatma Gandhi, Mother Teresa, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr? What mysterious wonders are this great cloud of witnesses performing in our lives or in our world today — in some cases, even centuries after their deaths?

What our ancestors, known and unknown, can do for us now is certainly a mystery; even so, I find myself addressing them most mornings and quite often throughout the day. As I awaken, I often go through a litany of names, including friends and relatives whom I can remember. I don't pray to them. I simply say hello and wish them well. Somehow, I feel that they are with me in mysterious ways. In fact, some of my decisions are made because, in an odd sort of way, I want them to be proud of the work that I am doing. As a child, I was reminded to do the right thing because God was watching. I still believe that; but I also believe that there is a great cloud of witnesses present with us, in some mysterious way. Maybe they are within the Holy Spirit and are helpers from the spirit world.

The mysterious is difficult to understand, explain, or identify. I thank God for it because mystery opens up a beautiful world of possibilities, fueled by our imaginations and our beliefs. Albert Einstein suggested that it is the source of all true art and science. Indeed, it is also at the heart of most religious practices — where our mysterious cloud of witnesses may have helped to guide us for thousands of years. Maybe each of us will be one of those witnesses someday. I don't know. It is a mystery after all!
